Retiring cop slams police brass

Chief calls him a 'disgruntled' former employee

A Palo Alto police officer wrote a scathing retirement letter attacking the department's leadership for being incompetent and out of touch and calling on the men and women of the department to stand up against them.

Police Chief Robert Jonsen said he won't respond to specific comments made by "a disgruntled employee," but that the letter surprised him and he is addressing stress felt by his officers in recent months.

The letter from Chris Moore, who retired on Aug. 28 after 12 years in Palo Alto, provides a rare glimpse into the generally private world of policing, shining light on one man's relationship with his higher-ups and fellow officers.

Moore wrote the letter to the entire police department before he left. He criticized Jonsen, Assistant Chief Andrew Binder and captains Zach Perron and April Wagner. He also called out the police officers union for being weak, and he encouraged officers to take action.

"To the men and women of the department, there are still fights to fight. and I encourage you to not live in fear or have further regrets," Moore wrote. "Remember, you have a choice in everything you do every day. Don't be a [See COP, page 30]
